BFA IN DANCE PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The Missouri State University Department of Theatre and Dance offers a BFA in Theatre and Dance with options in Acting, Dance, Design, and Technology and Stage Management. The three BFA options share a common core curriculum of 31 credit hours; all students then complete 47 credit hours in their major option.

The BFA Dance program is designed to instill the knowledge and skills needed to pursue a successful career in dance. The curriculum for the BFA is focused on performance and choreography. Upon completion of this degree you will be prepared for a career in performance and/or choreography. It is also a great foundation for pursuing further education as a director, costumer, writer, teacher, physical therapist and/or dance therapist...or any other dance-related profession.

BS IN DANCE PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The BS Dance program is a generalist dance degree for the student who wants to explore broader interest in the dance field. This program requires an additional major or minor to complete the BS degree. This extra area of study, of your choice, provides a unique opportunity to examine and explore dance's interaction with our socio-political landscape. In addition to your second major/minor, maintaining a rigorous training program in technique, choreography, history, pedagogy, dance science and other dance related topics is expected.

This program is created to provide an individualized study in dance. You will work with both dance faculty and faculty of your second area of study. All Missouri State undergraduate programs must complete the General Education Requirements, which include a diverse selection of classes in the arts, sciences, humanities, technology, and business.

DANCE MINOR

The dance minor offers a flexible way to continue to study dance in higher education. Dance minors can tailor technique classes and theory classes in a flexible way in areas of their interest.

DANCE PROGRAM MISSION

The MSU Dance Program strives to maintain high standards in dance technique, composition, and theory. The program encourages students to investigate, through creative activities and scholarly research, the multifaceted and ever-changing world of dance. This comprehensive preparation reflects the realities of the professional arena, which often contradict the assumed limits of a career in dance. By taking advantage of a variety of techniques, performance experiences, the composition series and scholarly and practical courses, students can acquire wide-ranging skills in a variety of facets of the discipline of dance. In this way, we encourage young artists to be prepared to meet the needs and challenges of today's world.

Jessica Madden (M.F.A.) began her professional career in Chicago where she worked for five years as a Teaching Artist for Hubbard Street Dance Chicago in their Education, Youth, Community, and Adaptive Dance Programs, receiving the company's first Teaching Artist Fellowship in 2014-15. Jessica also had opportunities to teach for Lookingglass Theatre and Chicago Ballet Arts. In 2021 she earned her Master of Fine Arts degree with an emphasis in Choreography from The University of Iowa, where she received an Iowa Arts Fellowship and Teaching Assistantship position within the Department of Dance. She comes to Missouri State having just completed her fourth year at St. Lawrence University, where she led dance studies in their Performance and Communication Arts Department. In all aspects of her work – creative, pedagogical, and traditional scholarship – Jessica's focus is on the body as a site of embodied memory and experience, investigating and employing dance as a catalyst for human connection and empathy.

This research has led to two presentations at the National Dance Education Organization's National Conference (2022 & 2024), two upcoming publications, and ten significant creative works since 2021. Jessica is excited to be joining the arts community at Missouri State this fall!

Lorraine "Rain" Stippec is a dancer, choreographer, educator, and scholar whose work bridges performance, research, and community engagement. She holds an M.F.A. in Dance from Washington University in St. Louis, where she was inducted into the National Honor Society of Dance Arts, and a B.F.A. in Dance with a Modern emphasis, magna cum laude with Department Honors, from Webster University. Her professional career includes touring China as a performer and choreographer, performing at The Muny and Fabulous Fox Theatre, and presenting choreography at regional and national American College Dance Association festivals and professional and collegiate concerts. Rain performed with moSTLY TAP under STL Rhythm Collaborative, recognized among Dance Magazine's "Top 25 to Watch" in 2023, and previously directed STLRC's Pre-Professional

Student Ensemble. Her research explores rhythm, affect, resilience, and embodied knowledge and has been presented nationally and internationally through the Dance Studies Association and University of Malta. A 2026 Regional Arts Commission Artist Support Grant recipient, her interdisciplinary research investigates dance as a preventative modality for PTSD from gun violence.

Per Course (part-time) Faculty:

Haley Bradstreet Olszewski (she/her/hers): Ballet

Haley comes to MSU from Los Angeles where she was most recently working at the world-renowned Colburn School as a faculty member and administrator. Before relocating to the west coast, she coached PennBallet at the University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia, taught ballet to all ages in Vermont, and performed with PH Dance and other regional companies. Originally from New Jersey, Haley's training includes intensives with The New Jersey Ballet, The Rock School, and Saratoga Summer Dance. She holds a BA in Dance from Mercyhurst University where she also taught open ballet classes, orchestrated several dance events, and performed with the Lake Erie Ballet Company.

Susan Bennett: Dance Appreciation

Susan Bennett is an Adjunct Professor of Theatre and Dance at Missouri State University and received the 2019 MOCRA Award for Online Design. She worked as a Dance Specialist with St. Louis Public Schools and founded the Kinesis Dance Company at University City, MO. Her students are known for their professional status in companies such as Ailey Dance Company. She has been a regular contributor to Dance Magazine as a specialist in early childhood movement and dance. She founded the Magnificent Moving Kids teacher training program as Director of Arts in Motion, St Louis. She cares deeply about student success.

Angi Black: Tap, Jazz

Classically trained in ballet, tap and jazz dance with strong study and experience in musical theatre, lyrical and ballroom, Angi Black has worked professionally for almost 30 years as an actor, singer and dancer, as well as choreographer and director. She studied at Missouri State University, Louisiana State University, and Broadway Dance Center in New York City. Angi Black is the tap instructor for the Department of Theatre and Dance. She is currently the dance director at Springfield Little Theatre and Director of SLT's Illumination Dance Company.

Allegra Schaeffer (she/her): Jazz

Allegra Schaeffer is a dance educator, choreographer, and performer with over 14 years of experience teaching dance and musical theatre. Originally from St. Charles, Missouri, she began her training at Dayspring School of the Arts before earning a Bachelor of Fine Arts in Musical Theatre and a Bachelor of Science in Dance from Missouri State University. In addition to her academic training, Allegra holds certifications in Mixed Method Pilates, Active Isolated Stretching, and Progressing Ballet Technique, reflecting her commitment to anatomy-informed dance training. Her professional experience includes performing on two children's theatre tours, teaching Jazz, Ballet, Tap, Modern, and Musical Theatre at studios in Springfield and St. Louis, Missouri, and choreographing and directing productions for schools and community theatres. She has also developed ballet curricula for multiple dance programs. Allegra currently teaches at The Bodysmith Pilates and Fitness Studio and Lauren Ashley Dance Center.

Musicians for Dance Classes:

Kyle Aho

Kyle Aho is a dance accompanist in the MSU Theatre & Dance Department and also teaches jazz piano, jazz combo, and improvisation in the Music Department. Kyle has a bachelor's degree in piano performance from Idaho State University, a master's degree in jazz performance from the New England Conservatory and a master's degree in music theory from Missouri State University. In addition to playing for classes and teaching in the Music Department, Kyle teaches Music Resources for Dancers.

PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS

Admission Process

BFA Dance Option: In addition to applying to Missouri State University, you are required to submit a formal application to the department for an audition into the Dance program, with a letter describing your motivation to pursue a degree in dance. This audition process affords us the opportunity to evaluate your training and assess your potential. It also gives you the chance to decide if this program suits your goals and abilities.

BS in Dance: While the Bachelor of Science (BS) in Dance does not require an audition, in addition to applying to Missouri State University, you are required to submit a letter describing your motivation to pursue a degree in dance. In order for the Dance faculty to place each student at the appropriate starting level of technique, students must take a placement class or submit a video before enrolling in any dance technique courses.

Acceptance Criteria

- Talents, abilities, passion, and potential in your area of interest in dance
- Intellectual curiosity and desire to learn
- Appetite for movement
- Desire and discipline to develop a variety of professional skills
- Collaborative spirit and positive attitude toward self and others

Placement Classes & Reviews

Formal assessment of dance technique happens each semester around midterms. During Dance Lab, students will be assessed to determine what level of technique they should register for in the coming semester. Any dance major in the BFA and BS program is required to attend assessment class/es in order to register for dance technique.

BFA Reviews:

BFA Dance Majors are required to participate in several reviews throughout their time at Missouri State.

- First Semester Review: Check In
In Finals Week, first semester (Fall- Year 1), students will meet with dance faculty for their first BFA Review Meeting. In this meeting, students will discuss their transition to Missouri State and goals for the rest of their time in the program.
- Fourth Semester Review: Technical Review
In Finals Week, fourth semester (Spring- Year 2), students will meet with dance faculty for their second Review Meeting. This meeting is focused on the technical requirements of the dance BFA. Faculty will provide feedback on the student's capacity to attain the 300-level in two dance techniques, and students will declare which techniques they are pursuing as their specialties. In order to graduate, BFA students must achieve 300-level in two of the following - ballet, tap, contemporary, and/or jazz.
- Fifth Semester Review: Project Preparation
In Finals Week, 5th semester (Fall- Year 3), students will meet with dance faculty for their third Review Meeting. This meeting is focused on preparation for one's senior project and preparation for post-graduation goals. Be prepared to discuss goals and plans so that faculty can help guide portfolio development and networking activities towards goals.
- Eighth Semester Review: Look Back
In finals week, 8th semester (Spring- Year 4), students will meet with dance faculty to celebrate their time at MSU and discuss next steps.

BS Reviews:

BS Dance Majors are required to participate in several reviews throughout their time at Missouri State.

- First Semester Review: Check-In
In Finals Week, first semester (Fall- Year 1), students will meet with dance faculty for their first BS Review Meeting. In this meeting, students will discuss their transition to Missouri State and goals for the rest of their time in the program.
- Fourth Semester Review: Field Review
In Finals Week of the fourth semester (Spring- Year 2), students will meet with dance faculty for their second Review Meeting. This meeting is focused on the students' emerging research interest(s) which may inform the student's Prospectus and Final Research Project. The student will prepare a Field Review which highlights existing research in the field of dance (and/or other relevant fields) that aligns with their own research interests, identify and explain any deficits or gaps in existing research, and explain the ways in which their own research may add to the field in unique and meaningful ways. The student will prepare a 5-10 minute presentation of their Field Review to be given to the dance faculty in the Second Year Review Meeting. The Field Review in tandem with the Prospectus will account for 10% of the student's Final Research Project.
- Fifth Semester Review: Prospectus
In Finals Week of their 5th semester (Fall- Year 3), students will meet with dance faculty for their third Review Meeting. This meeting is focused on preparation for senior projects and preparation for post-graduation goals. Be prepared to turn in a prospectus so that faculty can help guide senior project research and development. Upon Successful completion of Field Review and Prospectus, the student may formally begin work on their Final Research Project.
- Eighth Semester Review: Look Back
In finals week 8th semester (Spring- Year 4), students will meet with dance faculty to celebrate their time at MSU and discuss next steps.

Probation and Program Excusal

If students do not meet the criteria outlined below, additional meetings will be scheduled during end of semester meetings to evaluate the student's growth. If the Faculty deems the criteria are not being met, the student will be placed on probation for one semester. At the end of the probationary period, a determination will be made as to whether the student should continue or be released from the program. The Assessment shall consist of a faculty-student meeting during which a discussion of strengths, improvement, challenges, short-term and long-term goals will be determined. If pressing issues arise in the middle of the academic year, faculty can call an emergency review meeting.

Academic Criteria

- Maintenance of a cumulative GPA of 2.5 -Required
- Completion of 12 credits per semester - Highly recommended
- Completion of a minimum of three to six technique class credit hours per semester- Highly recommended
- Completion of a Final Project (BFA or BS)
- Completion of Review Meetings on schedule as listed above or an adapted schedule for transfer students
- Passing of second year Field Review (BS Students)

Performance Criteria

- Audition for the Fall and Spring Dance concert. Work as choreographer or dancer in at least two departmental productions (BS Majors)/at least 4 departmental productions (BFA Majors) during your time at MSU. *(continued on next page)*

- Demonstrate artistic growth throughout training program, and make progress toward defined goals (both academic and artistic)
- Passing of Technique Review (BFA Students)

PROFESSIONALISM AND CREATIVE ETHICS

Professionalism and Creative Ethics will be specifically defined by each choreographer, teacher, and director that you engage with. However, this handbook will provide you base level expectations of behaviors and actions that are valued during your time here. These expectations are developed in accordance with the university's Public Affairs Mission with the three pillars being: ethical leadership, cultural competence, and community engagement. Below are examples of how Professionalism and Creative Ethics can be demonstrated in the classroom, rehearsal space, backstage and on stage, and online. Things to consider when applying the Public Affairs Mission to Professionalism and Creative Ethics in the dance field include:

- Recognize and value multicultural contributions of dance practices
- Avoid using language and mindsets that place genres of dance on an hierarchical system
- Create dance spaces that are welcoming of all cultures, races, gender identity and/or expression, abilities, ages, sizes, and religions
- Be an advocate and leader in your community and field by expecting Professionalism and Creative Ethics in yourself and others around you
- Actively seek and engage new and historical resources to inform your practice
- Respect other people's bodies and property – in the studio, in the classroom, in the dressing rooms, in the theaters. Be sure to ask for consent before engaging in touch or using something that is not yours.
- Respect the spaces that hold our dance practices. Leave the space cleaner and neater than you found it.

Dancers are expected to practice the following customary points of professionalism and creative ethics while participating in classes, rehearsals, performances, and online:

Class

- Attend all of your classes. Come into the studio ready to work, concentrate and commit to the experience. It is not up to the instructor to motivate you.
- Come dressed, on the floor, and ready to dance by the class start time. If your schedule allows, it is good professional practice to arrive early and warm yourself up before class so that you are ready, physically and mentally.
- If you have a schedule that prohibits you from arriving on time, be sure to communicate with your director. If you need to leave the class early, be sure you have made arrangements with the instructor or choreographer ahead of time.
- Check the syllabus for each class for information about proper attire.
- Keep track of due dates for assignments – these are noted in the course syllabus.
- Unless prompted to do so by the instructor, it is inappropriate to correct other dancers in class. Inform the instructor or choreographer in private of any problems you have navigating classroom or rehearsal spaces.
- Please do not eat on the dance floor. Keep water in a container that you can close.
- Check with your instructor in regard to their cell phone policy including recording their choreography, and uploading their choreography to social media. It is good professional practice to silence your phone.

Rehearsal

- Know the choreographer: some invite suggestions from the cast, but others do not. It's smart – and respectful – to find out what process will be used, in every rehearsal situation.
- Attend all of your rehearsals. Come into the studio ready to work, concentrate and commit to the experience. It is not up to the choreographer to motivate you. If your schedule allows, it is good professional practice to arrive early and warm yourself up before rehearsal so that you are ready, physically and mentally.
- Check with your choreographer in regard to their cell phone policy, including recording their choreography, and uploading their choreography to social media. It is good professional practice to silence your phone.

Backstage and Theatre & Dance Policies

- Arrive on time for your call. Sign in as soon as you arrive.
- The Stage Manager is in charge during production week. Pay attention, and do as you are asked. Take any problems, questions or concerns to the Stage Manager and/or the Concert Director.
- Check the callboards, your campus e-mail and the sign-in board several times a day during production week for any scheduling changes.
- The Costume Shop is NOT a Green Room. Do not congregate there during performances.
- Silence must be strictly respected backstage and in the stairwells, during rehearsals and performances.
- Leave your valuables at home or with the Stage Manager – not in the dressing room.
- No food or drink backstage, nor in the house. Refrain from eating or drinking things that could damage your costume.
- Bring and wear footwear that you can slip on and off easily. Do NOT wander around the Costume Shop, Scene Shop or the backstage area barefoot. Our Scene shop exists backstage, which means it is unsafe to walk around barefoot. Please keep any shoes you wear on stage clean.
- Bring warm-up clothing for pre-performance warm-up (do not warm up in costume).
- Following the warm-up, the Stage Manager and choreographer(s) will give notes.
- Do not wear jewelry or nail polish on stage, unless required as part of your costume. If you wear any kind of non-removable decoration that will show, speak with your choreographers about expectations during performances.
- Dancers provide their own make-up and do their own hair. Speak with your choreographer about specific hair and make-up expectations.
- Speak with your choreographer about hair expectations.
- Hang up your costumes when you finish wearing them. Return them to the costume shop at the end of each performance.
- Ask the costume crew where to leave any costume items that need washing – including personal dancewear worn as part of your costume.
- Do not leave any items in the dressing rooms overnight.
- After the show, remove costumes before meeting family and friends.
- Only crew and performers are allowed backstage (no family/friends)

Communication

- Check your school email regularly. These messages provide information and opportunities. Read them. Respond to them. You don't want to miss out on an audition, a deadline, a change of room, clarification of an assignment, or an invitation to attend an awesome free performance!
- If circumstances occur that interfere with your ability to attend class and/or rehearsal, notify your instructor(s) and/or choreographer(s).

Social Media

- Social media has become an important professional tool for networking. However, remember that you have little control over how your social media posts are shared and viewed. Therefore, social media can also have considerable negative consequences upon your life and early career. Your social media representation of yourself is as important as your off-line behavior. All Professionalism and Creative Ethics standards including consequences for not meeting those expectations also apply to social media.
- Protect yourself. Social media is a goldmine for preying upon young performers – financially, emotionally, and sexually. Protect yourself and your personal information.
- **Never use social media to create an unsafe or threatening situation in regard to teachers, directors, fellow students or yourself.**

TECHNIQUE PROFICIENCY STANDARDS

The placement class held every semester will let students know which level they are eligible to register for in each discipline of dance that's being taught. Students in the BFA program are required to achieve the 300-level in at least two disciplines, and those in the BS program should achieve at least the intermediate level in one discipline.

A rule of thumb is that the 100-level fundamentals class is designed for students with little or no prior training; 200-level (elementary) classes are designed for students with some amount of dance training and physical understanding of the elements of the discipline. It is normal for students to repeat 200-level classes multiple times. 300-level (intermediate) classes are designed to deepen students' physical and mental engagement with the work, with an expectation of increased autonomy in learning. The focus in 400-level (advanced) classes, in addition to maintaining and improving technical proficiency, is breadth of artistic expression through dance.

ACADEMIC ADVISING

This handbook includes an outline of required coursework and the semester breakdown for both the BFA in Dance and the BS in Dance 4-year programs. You will also find a link on pp. 19 to the MSU General Education Requirements. Your advisor will be one of the full-time Dance faculty members. Please consult with your advisor regularly in order to ensure that your class work meets your needs both artistically and academically.

Both Dance programs are rigorous, and the goal of the attached schedules is to assist you to be able to complete your studies in four years – with, of course, the requirement that you continually improve in technique and fully participate in the program and the department.

Please make sure to consult with your advisor EVERY semester, to ensure that you complete your coursework in a way that will allow you to graduate in a timely manner, and as a resource for such things as suggestions for summer intensives, and to discuss goals upon graduating.

- Placement in technique class levels is at the **discretion of the instructors**. It is expected that students will repeat dance classes at the same level before progressing to the next level.
 - **NOTE:** DAN 100 does NOT count toward the major. 100 level dance classes count only as electives in the Dance degree program, but may be required, depending on the dance level at which each major enters the program.
 - **NOTE:** The sample 4-year degree plan charts above list more than the required number of dance technique classes. This is because the dance faculty strongly suggests that all Dance majors should enroll in two technique classes each semester, so that they take at least one dance technique class each day throughout the four-year program.
- **Periodicity Warning: Certain classes are offered only during the fall or spring, and some are offered only every other year.**

- Present your research findings in an oral presentation of at least 10 minutes including time for questions.
- Include a visual poster component.
- Presentations will occur during the week of spring dance
- Prepare and submit a professional résumé and/or CV.

Grading: based on successful completion of the project, attention to guidelines, clarity of writing, and quality of research.

Opening Remarks: Introduce the points to be discussed.

Structure: Elaborate on each point, in the order presented in your introductory paragraph. Discuss each point.

Avoid Repeating Yourself: Avoid multiple sentences that say the same thing.

Empty Sentences: Watch out for sentences that contain no information and have no substance.

Citations: Be sure to site your sources in your poster using Chicago format.

Proofread: Check for grammatical errors, incorrect punctuation, and typos. Practice presenting your poster presentation out loud. Eliminate slang words and phrases. Take your script to the Writing Center, before sending it to the faculty for comments.

Criteria for Dance Regents/Activities Scholarships include:

- Maintain an overall GPA of 2.50
- Earn at least a C in all DAN and THE courses required for the major
- Demonstrate a commitment to the department by auditioning for and participation in Theatre and Dance Department and Dance program productions and activities

Information about work/study scholarships is available from the Office of Financial Aid, in Carrington Hall.

Out of State Fee Waivers are awarded to incoming students who qualify, based on GPA and ACT/SAT scores. Renewal of university Out of State Waivers is automatically awarded to those who maintain a 3.0 cumulative GPA.

PERFORMANCE & EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES

Auditions

- A cumulative grade point average of 2.5 must be maintained in order to participate in all MSU Department of Theatre and Dance productions. (i.e., In order to be eligible for a fall production, the student's grade point average from the previous spring must be at least 2.5).
- All eligible BFA Dance Majors are **required** to audition for all dance concerts – unless they are already committed to another faculty approved departmental activity for that semester. Exceptions will only be made in cases of medical necessity, death in the family, academic probation, etc. Missing an audition may result in being placed on Probation which can result in not being able to register for DAN 482/DAN 492 Senior Projects.
- All Dance majors are encouraged to audition for every department production, but (after consulting with the director) majors may elect to refuse a role if cast in a play that contains material they find objectionable because of salacious content, offensive language, religious defamation, nudity, or other kinds of material that could be construed by a reasonable person as objectionable. You are also encouraged to audition for the experience if you do not want to be cast in a production.
- When participating in department Unified Auditions, Dance majors should follow the regulations for the Acting and Musical Theatre majors, and submit a professional headshot and resume at those auditions.
 - **Headshots**
Yes! You need professional headshots. You also need a professional resume. The BFA Acting Guidelines has extensive information about how to prepare, shoot, and how to select images. That document is available on the Theatre and Dance Department website, under Department Documents.

Callboards

The department has a callboard on the second floor of Craig Hall. A callboard is your primary means of communication with production staff on any production you are participating in. It has a variety of postings: departmental announcements, sign-up sheets for auditions, cast lists, and other important information. Professional performers check the callboard as soon as they arrive at the theatre. We encourage you to begin that practice here at MSU. You may also find dance specific announcements such as summer intensives located in McDonald 203. Please get in the habit of checking both locations every day.

Fall and Spring Dance Concerts

The Fall and Spring Dance Concert are a part of the department's main stage production season, and are choreographed by MSU faculty, students, and guests. Student work will be adjudicated for the concerts, but will be shown in at least an informal lab showing. Auditions for this concert will be held during the second Friday during lab each semester.

ACDA Regional Conference

As a member of the American College Dance Festival Association, the MSU Dance program participates in the annual Regional Conference, which takes place during Spring semester. Three works are selected to be presented – two for adjudication, and the third for an informal (non-adjudicated) concert. In addition, there is usually a large variety of classes each day.

Summer Intensives in Dance / Study Abroad
